FROM THE RABBI'S STUDY:

I'm currently in the midst of planning for the start of my upcoming sabbatical. As many of you are already aware, I will be on sabbatical from February 20th through May 20th. I plan to spend that time in Israel, with Jerusalem as my base. As I write these words on November 28th, Israel and Hamas are officially in a temporary day-by-day truce while Hamas frees a few of its Israeli and foreign hostages each day, and Israel releases three times that number of Palestinian prisoners each day. It all continues to be an excruciating situation for Israelis and Palestinians caught up in the effects of Hamas's ongoing nihilistic terrorism. There was indeed a ceasefire in place before Hamas violently violated it on October 7th. And, given that Hamas leadership has since then explicitly vowed to undertake similar outrageous actions in the future¹, Israel has had no other reasonable option but to try to prevent such massacres from ever happening again by forcibly removing Hamas from power in Gaza.

In any event, I'm still hopeful that things will be safe enough for me to follow through with plans to head to Israel in February. I don't mind ducking into bomb shelters from time to time if need be. I've done it before (back in summer 2014 when I went on a Reconstructionist rabbis study mission in Israel during an earlier Israel-Hamas war).

As this year's celebration of Chanukah approaches, I am reminded of the first time I visited Israel, back in December 1981, when I arrived there during Chanukah of that year. Though I had grown up in New York City, with its large Jewish population, it was still a mindblowing experience to be in a country where the menorah lighting each night was a national event. At the time, I was a 20-year-old college junior in the middle of spending my junior year abroad in Scotland at the University of Edinburgh. I had long had the vague aspiration that someday I'd like to visit Israel. Semester break from Edinburgh turned out to be a good time to do it since I was already on the other side of the Atlantic.

I'll never forget how much at home I felt in Israel and how blown away I was by the new experience of being in a country where the Jewish calendar predominated, and where Hebrew was not just a language of synagogue prayer. And especially, how moving it was to be in the very land where the foundational stories of my people had taken place.

After that first visit, I found myself thinking about making *aliyah* (emigrating) to Israel once I would finish my undergraduate studies back in the States. Ultimately, I abandoned that idea (much to the relief of my parents), but not before going back to Israel the summer of 1982 (at the end of my year in Scotland) to volunteer on a kibbutz and see more of the country.

The next time I was in Israel was thirteen years later, when Rabbi Amy Bernstein and I (though we were both still just rabbinical students then) spent the 1995-96 academic year at Ben-Gurion University in Beer-Sheva. It was in many

respects a difficult year, what with the assassination of Prime Minister Yitzchak Rabin, z"l, by a Jewish terrorist, and a wave of bus bombings by Palestinian terrorists in its aftermath. The mid-1990's, prior to Rabin's assassination, had been years when a peaceful settlement between Israel and the Palestinians had seemed within grasp. In recent years, with the ongoing nihilism of Hamas and the extremism of elements of the Israeli settler movement, that goal has been retreating farther and farther from view. Perhaps in the aftermath of the current Israel-Hamas war such a breakthrough might be achieved – though that would probably require change in leadership on both the Palestinian and Israeli sides. But we can still hope...

When I had my previous sabbatical in Israel seven years ago, I based myself in Tel Aviv and focused on improving my facility with modern Hebrew. This time around, in Jerusalem, I plan to focus on Talmud study at the Fuchsberg Jerusalem Center. (More information about that educational institution can be found here: <u>https://fuchsbergcenter.org/year-semester/</u>). Given the current situation, I also hope and plan that I'll have opportunities to do some volunteer work assisting in efforts to respond to the challenges caused by the current war.

God willing, this will all work out. Meanwhile, we continue to pray for a successful end to the current conflict and for an end to the suffering of Israelis and Palestinians alike.

There's a contemporary Israeli Chanukah song that I really like called <u>"Banu Choshekh</u> <u>Legaresh"</u> ("We have come to banish darkness"). May the aspirations of that song come true before long: באנו חושך לגרש באנו חושך לגרש כל אחד הוא אור קטן וכולנו אור איתן סורה חושך, הלאה שחור

(Ba-nu cho-shekh l'ga-reish, bya-dei-nu or vaeish, Kol e-chad hu or ka-tan, v'chu-la-nu or eitan, Su-ra cho-shekh, hal-ah sh'chor, Sura....mip-nei ha-or) ("We have come to banish darkness. In our hands are light and fire. Each person is a small light. But together we are a mighty light. Get away darkness, flee before the light!")

NEWS FROM RELIGIOUS & HEBREW SCHOOLS

The CHUM food shelf continues to rely on monthly donations of tuna from our congregation to help those who don't have enough to eat. 




Annual Meeting Sunday, December 3rd, 2023 11:00am



Victoria Momb



Victoria Momb is the newest member of Temple Israel. She joins us, courtesy of the Federal Aviation Administration (see below), after having just completed her conversion the beginning of November.

Victoria grew up in Bothell, Washington, close to the Pacific coast. Water must have held a special attraction for her, because she joined the Navy right after graduating high school. In her seven years in the Navy, she lived in Pensacola and Virginia Beach, and was deployed on a ship to the Mediterranean area, including the Red Sea and the Persian Gulf. Also in the Navy, she was trained to be an air traffic controller.

It was in the Navy that Victoria met her future husband, Michael Gendron, in 2014. Michael hails from New Hampshire, close to the Atlantic coast. They were married in 2019.

2020 was a big year for Victoria. After her naval stint ended that year, she got a bachelor's degree in history from Southern New Hampshire University, afterwards working at the MacArthur Memorial Museum and Cape Henry Lighthouse, both in Virginia. Later still in 2020, she was hired as an air traffic controller by the FAA, - which is how she ended up in Duluth!

The fact that both Victoria and Michael are from coastal areas is significant, because they find Duluth to be a wonderful place, reminiscent of the coasts they both grew up near. Victoria enjoys her work at the airport, and loves the fact that Duluth has both small town and big city vibes - it's just the right size for her. Michael has found work as assistant news director at WDIO. They have three pets, two cats and a dog. Victoria described herself as a cinephile and foodie. In their spare time, they like to travel, watch movies, cook or eat out, and catch concerts. In addition to traveling all over the US, they've been to Spain, the Caribbean, and have a spring trip planned to London. One little known fact about Victoria is that she is in love with fountain pens, both collecting and writing with them.

Her journey to Judaism grew from her interest in history. "If you look at the history of almost any country, there's Jewish history there as well." Gradually, she became more interested in Judaism, found that Jewish values aligned with her own, and her interest kept growing. When she came to services for the first time (at Temple Israel in May 2022), she felt a connection with the ritual, music, and values that she had not felt previously other religious settings. Add to that the friendly, welcoming atmosphere at Temple, and she "felt comfortable and safe from the second I walked in". Attending services when work does not get in the way is the highlight of her week.

It is a highlight for us to welcome Victoria to membership in Temple Israel!

THE ISRAEL-HAMAS WAR COMES CLOSE TO HOME

During the Temple's Shabbat kiddush lunch on Saturday 10/28/23, UMD student and Temple Israel Religious School staff member Raina Kronfeld shared with Rabbi David that she had family who had been kidnapped by Hamas during their October 7th attack on Israel. Rabbi David asked Raina if she or her mother (Jewish Historical Society of the Upper Midwest Executive Director Robin Doroshow) could write something about this for our Temple Bulletin. Here is Robin Doroshow's response: Hello Rabbi Steinberg,

Raina asked me to put together a short blurb regarding our connection to recently released hostage, Yocheved Lifshitz.

My second cousin, Oded Amichai, is a retired Technion scientist (actually he IS a rocket scientist) - here is a bit of info on him - <u>https://www.jewishpost.com/news/Dr-Oded-Amichai-SkyGuard-will-Defend-Israel.html</u>

My cousin Oded Amichai is married to Talma Lifshitz Amichai.

Talma, along with her family, spent the Holocaust years in Singapore. Talma's brother, also named Oded (i.e., Oded Lifshitz) is currently a hostage. Oded Lifshitz's wife, Yocheved Lifshitz, was one of the elderly women released a few days ago.

(So, Yocheved and Oded Lifshitz are my second cousin Oded Amichai's sister-in-law and brother-in-law.)

My cousin Oded told us that he and Talma visited with Yocheved a day or so after her release and he said she is unwell both physically and mentally, and a shadow of her former self.

My cousin Oded also said that Kibbutz Nir Or, where Yocheved and Oded Lifshitz had lived and worked as peace activists, was a paradise previously and has been destroyed entirely. Yocheved's gesture in shaking hands with the Hamas captor upon her release showed me the depth of her commitment to peace and a depth of character I can only imagine.

While I haven't met the Lifshitz's, I have certainly spent much time over many years with the Amichai family - Talma, Oded, Gadi and Ori, in their home in Haifa and in our home in St. Paul. Most recently we saw them when Rich, Theo, Raina and I traveled to Israel in 2008.

Temple Israel Religious and Hebrew School is in immediate need of a teacher for its Bet Hebrew class.

During this second-level class, students who have learned the letter and vowel sounds of the Alef-Bet begin to read the Hebrew words found in very familiar home blessings and prayers. Through this familiarity coupled with repetition in the Kol Yisrael 1 curriculum, students find initial success and begin to develop reading fluency and a desire to try longer and less familiar prayers. Through demonstration and participation, they learn to conduct the rituals associated with these home blessings and prayers. Basic root words, such as amen (to agree) and baruch (to bless) are introduced, launching students on an exploration of meaning and understanding of our sacred language.

The ideal candidate has proficiency in reading ritual and prayerbook Hebrew, and a strong desire to share that proficiency with two 9-yearolds who are getting their first taste of reading it.

Class times are 5:30 to 7:30 p.m. on Wednesdays and 9 to 10 a.m. on Saturdays.
