I am pleased to witness and hear about the energy shared at Temple of late. The .5k shmooze fest was a resounding success (kudos and thank you's to the chairs, planning committee and volunteers) and recent attendance at services has been solid. That said, I will continue to beat my engagement drum, after all involvement is the perfect antidote to the feeling like you don't belong. # FROM THE RABBI'S STUDY:

With the arrival of the summer months our Temple calendar lightens up a bit. However, not all is in hibernation: On July 14th, we'll have as a guest speaker Cantor Rachel Stock Spilker to tell us about efforts underway to create a new pluralistic Mikvah facility in the Twin Cities. On July 21st, our new Temple band, the "Shabbatunes" will be taking part in the Shabbat evening service. On July 28th, all the way from Finland (that's the country, not the Minnesota town) we have a presentation by author John Simon about the fascinating history of the Jews of Finland during World War Two. We have our annual Family Shabbat/Picnic-Barbecue at Billings Park, Superior on August 11th, Reva Polacsek's bat mitzvah on August 19th, and our "South Shore Shabbat" service and dinner in Ashland, Wisconsin on August 25th.

Meanwhile, planning is already well under way for the High Holidays (Rosh Hashanah starts the evening of September 15th) and for the 5784/2023-24 program year.

As for me, when you read this article at the beginning of July, I'll be in the midst of a twoweek vacation trip with my beloved to Ireland and Scotland. Ireland will be a new experience for me but, as some of you know, I've spent considerable time in Scotland over the course of my life. While I was an undergraduate at the University of Pennsylvania, I spent my junior year abroad (1981-82) as an exchange student at the University of Edinburgh. That was a turning point in my life. When we're in Scotland this month, we'll be staying with Scottish friends of mine whom I've known since that time and with whom I've exchanged a number of visits over the years on both sides of the Atlantic.

One of the things that really surprised me back when I was an impressionable 20-year-old spending the year in Scotland, was that I expected to be homesick for Americans – but it turns out I wasn't. And I *didn't* expect to be homesick for Jews – but it turned out that I was. At that time in my life, I wasn't particularly religiously observant – though I always liked being Jewish and was never particularly estranged from it. But that year, for the first time in my life, I was in a place where I got to know folks for whom I was the first Jewish person that they had ever met. Growing

up as I did in New York City and Long Island and going to college at a school like U. Penn (which has a significant number of Jewish students), I had never before encountered such a situation.

And guess what, it ended up prompting me to think about and integrate Judaism much more fully into my life – a gradual and ongoing process that ultimately led me to rabbinical school — and to Temple Israel.

Of course, that's just a very shorthand version of my story, but the point I'd like to share with you is that it's a very special thing to be Jewish in a place where there are not many Jews. It means that your Judaism isn't something that you can just experience by osmosis (as to some extent is the case in a place like New York). In that respect, all of us who live in the Twin Ports and its environs (and especially all of you who grew up here as well) play a critical part in the Jewish community in a way that is not so easy to do in a big city. The challenge of being a small minority is a blessing as well – and an opportunity.

I hope everyone has a great summer, a time of relaxation and renewal, and that you take that opportunity in the months and years to come to be actively involved in the life of our congregation – because we value you, we need you, and we are inspired by you.

# NEWS FROM RELIGIOUS & HEBREW SCHOOLS

Sitting in the hospital room waiting for my husband to awaken from anesthesia, I returned to a book I thus far had struggled to start: Naomi Levy's "Einstein and the Rabbi: Searching for the Soul." Looking at the dated note Pam Griggs had tucked inside, I realized I had held onto this book for an entire year without much success.

The first couple chapters had annoyed me. The author writes about the deeply spiritual and

encouraging relationship she had with her father, who died when she was 15, and how she sensed "his presence" return to her during her college years and beyond. My father died 40 years ago, a few days before Father's Day and 10 days short of my 22<sup>nd</sup> birthday. I don't' recall any deep or spiritual conversations between us.

I do remember how he tended his vegetable garden on summer evenings. And I remember how he would come into the kitchen after work on winter evenings and amazingly fall asleep standing up by the heat register while my Mom cooked dinner. We conspired on things like buying gifts for my Mom and tolerated church services by taking on roles – me in back playing the organ and he in back ushering and taking up the weekly collection -- where we could sneak outside from time to time.

My Dad died when he was 60. He had battled lung cancer for more than two years, then defying the doctors' predictions of having less than a year to live. My Mom said he held on so long because he wanted to see me graduate from college. I remember one of our last conversations. Rather than start a search for a full-time job, I had decided to take the month off after college to help care for him at home. He had heard there was a secretarial job open at one of the chemical plants down the Ohio River and wanted me to apply. I was disappointed he didn't recognize my goal to become a newspaper journalist and overlooked his concern that he see me financially settled before he died.

He never knew I became that reporter, and a city editor and ultimately managing editor of a newspaper owned by one of the best journalism companies in the country. He never knew that I moved a thousand miles away to a cold but beautiful city on the western edge of Lake Superior, bought my first house and made a home there. He never knew I converted to Judaism. He never met and got to know my loving husband Tom. He never met and got to know our precious son Sam. He never knew I became a teacher.

As "older" parents who both lost their Dads at an early age, Tom and I worry about being there for Sam as he moves on through his life. On the verge of heading off to college, I find myself pausing in our conversations with him to impart my values and little nuggets of wisdom I've acquired.

Sitting in the hospital room, anxious for my husband to awaken from anesthesia, I tackle once again Naomi Levy's first chapter. She writes about bringing soul into all different parts of your life and how rewarding life will be when you do so. As I was reading, I thought, I should share this passage with Sam.

Instead, I will share this blessing with you from the end of her first chapter:

"May you follow the call of your soul, and may you come to laugh with pure joy the day your deepest yearning becomes a reality."

In the very last moments of his life, one of my Dad's deepest yearnings was to know that I would be OK. You can laugh, Dad, you can laugh.

Rachel Stock Spilker is one of the cantors at Mount Zion Temple and is Founder & President of Maayanot Community Mikveh of Minnesota





# **Meet Danny Friedman and Amanda Doran**



Danny and Amanda go back well over a decade in Duluth. Danny, raised in Cloquet, met Amanda in the Goodwill parking lot almost 15 years ago. Amanda, having grown up in Sauk Rapids, was in Duluth for her undergraduate degree. They like to joke that Amanda "plucked Danny out of the free bin." It seems to have been a good bargain for both, as they celebrated their 11<sup>th</sup> wedding anniversary this year.

While Amanda did not grow up on a farm, her grandparents owned a dairy farm where she spent a lot of childhood time, and where she developed a lifelong love of animals. After her undergraduate degree at UMD, she got her veterinarian degree at the Main U in the Twin Cities

Danny, meanwhile, did his undergraduate degree in Theater at Hamline University, and masters in English\_Education at the Main U. He taught English at high school and college level for 19 years, in Blaine, Grand Rapids, and Thunder Bay, Ontario.

Both have a passion for anything outside - canoeing, cycling, skiing, games and more. Danny led BWCA trips for 10 years through a school program he initiated. So, when Amanda' first veterinary job was in Thunder Bay, they not only

Danny currently is an undertaker at Dougherty Funeral Home (possibly the first Jewish undertaker in Duluth history); Amanda currently works as a livestock inspector for the USDA. Her favorite animal? Wolverine. (Take note: the wolverine, according to Wikipedia, "has a reputation for ferocity and strength out of proportion to its size"...)

Both Danny and Amanda are people of many interests. Keeping them on their toes are their two huskie shepherd rescue dogs, Lark and Hibou. In addition, they share a love of music, as well as reading, the arts and, not least, food & cooking. Danny plays guitar; Amanda paints and sculpts and is known to sell her crafts at local farmers markets. She's also the gardener of the pair.

# **Beginning Adult Hebrew**

Adult Beginning Hebrew: taught by Susan Rees

The primary text for the class is: Aleph Isn't Tough:
An Introduction to Hebrew for Adults, Book 1
(behrmanhouse.com) which can be purchased directly from the publisher or other online booksellers. Text material is supplemented in class by reading from Tanach and Siddur.

For July of 2023, the class is currently meeting from to 9:00 a.m. to 10:00 a.m. on Saturday mornings, affording the opportunity for students to attend the Temple Israel Shabbat morning service immediately after having been to class. The class will not meet in August.

Fall 2023 schedule will be determined based on interest and availability of students and teacher. Continuing students have previously learned the 22 letters of the Hebrew alphabet, final letters, the numerical values of each letter, and how to write them in script (cursive), New students welcome to join. For those totally unfamiliar with the Hebrew alphabet, there will be some catch up effort needed.

Classes starting in October: Register HERE

Familiarity with Hebrew can be a key to feeling at home in the Jewish community. Learn the shapes and sounds of the Hebrew alphabet, with a warm and supportive educator to guide you and a group of classmates for practicing together. Recognize and understand common Hebrew words and phrases that are often heard in Reform congregations and in Jewish prayer. Perfect for Introduction to Judaism alumni and other adults, this course assumes no prior Hebrew experience.

This course has been developed specifically for online learning, and is taught by experienced educators. Live sessions meet weekly over video conferencing. Participants are given access to online course materials and a link to purchase workbook.

# TEMPLE ISRAEL COVID-19 PROTOCOLS

(revised March 10, 2022)

- Anyone AGE 5 OR OVER must be fully vaccinated.
- Anyone AGE 12 OR OVER must have a booster when eligible to be considered fully vaccinated.
- Mask wearing is OPTIONAL.
- Six feet of social distancing is recommended, except for households and "pods" of fully vaccinated persons.
- Services are simulcast on Zoom, there will be no screen sharing of the prayer book. However, members may borrow or purchase prayer books and links for free downloads on your own personal devices can be found in our weekly "TTW" ("Temple This Week") email updates or by contacting the Temple office.

- Please be sure to check the health screening questionnaire posted at the building entrance.
   All attendees are required to review the questions and, if the answer to any question is "yes," should leave the building. We rely on attendees to individually review the questions and to be honest in their answers.
- We are maximizing efforts to maintain good air quality and recommend everyone get vaccinated.
