FROM THE RABBI'S STUDY:

As this edition of the Bulletin goes into print, we are in the midst of the 50-day period of Sefirat Ha'omer (The Counting of the Omer). The Torah prescribes that we should count a full seven weeks between the second night of Passover and the arrival of Shavuot (with the first day of Shavuot being day 50). Indeed, the very name of the latter holiday simply means "weeks." Thus, a clear connection is made between Passover, whose traditional nickname is Zeman Cheyruteynu ("The Season of Our Freedom") and Shavuot, whose traditional nickname is Zeman Matan Torateinu ("The Season of the Giving of our Torah").

The connection is spelled out in a classic rabbinic pun:

"[Torah] says 'the tablets were the work of God and the writing was the writing of God, which were engraved [Hebrew: חרות ("CHaRuT")] on the tablets.' [Exodus 32:16]. Don't read 'engraved' [CHaRuT] but rather read 'freedom' [Hebrew: "CHeRuT], for only the individual who is engaged in the study of Torah is truly free." (Pirke Avot 6:2)

We will celebrate Shavuot as a community, on Thursday, May 25th at 8:00 p.m. with an evening service that features the public reading of the Ten Commandments. This will be followed by a nice dessert oneg featuring cheese cake (yum!) in acknowledgment of the traditional custom of eating dairy dishes at Shavuot. There are several traditional explanations for eating dairy foods on Shavuot. My favorite is the explanation that this custom is derived from the phrase "honey and milk are under your lips" (Song of Songs 4:11), which traditional commentators saw as an allusion to the sweetness of Torah.

After we have our refreshments, those who wish can also stick around for another hour or so for an informal study session as a way of engaging with the tradition of <u>"Tikkun Leyl</u> <u>Shavuot.</u>" According to midrashic tradition, the Israelites overslept at Sinai on the morning that they were to receive the Torah and so the custom of studying Jewish texts all through the night of Shavuot developed in the Middle Ages as an attempt to make a "repair" (the literal definition of the word "tikkun") for that ancient communal faux pas...

I'm planning to focus on <u>Pirke Avot</u>, but if any of you have suggestions for other classic texts please let me know. (We'll also plan on including then a bit of studying of the weekly Torah portion as we won't be having our regular Friday noon Zoom Torah study session on May 26th.) NEWS FROM RELIGIOUS & HEBREW SCHOOLS

It was a dismal week. Second night Passover seder had been cancelled because not enough adults in our congregation could come together to cook a festive meal and prepare the ritual foods. Then Shabbat morning services were cancelled because Rabbi was away and no one else was available to lead us in communal prayer.

So, on Saturday, April 1, Religious and Hebrew School teachers and students took advantage of an empty kitchen and social hall to put on our own "model" Passover seder. Older students cooked matzah ball soup, boiled and shelled eggs, and set the tables. Middle students prepared and placed the ritual foods on the seder plates. Our youngest students made charoset.

We pulled everything together within a couple hours, then sat down to our hour-long seder. We went through the order of the activities, explaining and showing students the traditions of washing our hands, breaking the middle matzah, hiding (and finding) the afikomen, and telling the Passover story. We enjoyed eating parsley dipped in saltwater, bitter herbs (well not so much), Hillel sandwiches and our meal of matzah ball soup and boiled eggs. We drank four cups of grape juice. And we laughed and enjoyed each other's company.

Some parents stayed to help us in the kitchen. Some joined in the meal that their children so proudly prepared.

It wasn't formal. It wasn't fancy. But it was a gathering of Jewish community in an incredibly sacred moment. And it is an example of how the rest of us might come together less stressfully as a congregation on the second night of Passover next year.



2023 DULUTH DYLAN FEST JOHN BUSHEY MEMORIAL LECTURE presents "The Kabbala of Bob Dylan " Seth Rogovoy

Rogovoy is a writer, award-winning critic, book author, international lecturer, teacher, musician, radio commenta-tor and cultural journalist. He frequently writes about Jewish music and culture for a variety of publications. Seth has taught a variety of college-level and adult-ed courses on klezmer, Jewish music, and Bob Dylan, about whom he has written extensively. He is currently working on a book about the music of George Harrison for the Oxford Press. In this multimedia program incorporating still images, video, and close lyrical analysis, Seth Rogovoy, author of Bob Dylan: Prophet Mystic Poet (Scribner, 2009), explores the deep and profound influence of the Jewish background and scriptural roots on Bob Dylan's life and work. We will see how the Nobel Prize-winning rock poet's familiarity with Torah, Talmud, and Kabbalah has worked its way into his songs and public utterances, along with his embrace of Israel and the Jewish outreach organization Chabad. 


ZOOM Shabbat Services



Classes starting in June: Register <u>HERE</u>

Familiarity with Hebrew can be a key to feeling at home in the Jewish community. Learn the shapes and sounds of the Hebrew alphabet, with a warm and supportive educator to guide you and a group of classmates for practicing together. Recognize and understand common Hebrew words and phrases that are often heard in Reform congregations and in Jewish prayer. Perfect for Introduction to Judaism alumni and other adults, this course assumes no prior Hebrew experience.

This course has been developed specifically for online learning, and is taught by experienced educators. Live sessions meet weekly over video conferencing. Participants are given access to online course materials and a link to purchase workbook.

TEMPLE ISRAEL COVID-19 PROTOCOLS

(revised March 10, 2022)

- Anyone AGE 5 OR OVER must be fully vaccinated.
- Anyone AGE 12 OR OVER must have a booster when eligible to be considered fully vaccinated.
- Mask wearing is OPTIONAL.
- Six feet of social distancing is recommended, except for households and "pods" of fully vaccinated persons.
- Services are simulcast on Zoom, there will be no screen sharing of the prayer book. However, members may borrow or purchase prayer books and links for free downloads on your own personal devices can be found in our weekly "TTW" ("Temple

This Week") email updates or by contacting the Temple office.

- Please be sure to check the health screening questionnaire posted at the building entrance. All attendees are required to review the questions and, if the answer to any question is "yes," should leave the building. We rely on attendees to individually review the questions and to be honest in their answers.
- We are maximizing efforts to maintain good air quality and recommend everyone get vaccinated.
