# FROM THE RABBI'S STUDY:

Throughout the month of June, we are in the Book of Numbers in our lectionary cycle of weekly Torah readings. This fourth book of the Torah, called "Sefer Bemidbar" in Hebrew, is probably my favorite of the five books. It contains beautiful prayers like the priestly blessing:

"May the Eternal bless you and protect you!

May the Eternal deal kindly and graciously with you!

May the Eternal bestow divine favor upon you and grant you peace!" (Num. 6: 24-26)

And it includes teachings about the importance of learning from everyone, as when Moses berates Joshua for wanting to jail the young upstarts Eldad and Medad for unauthorized prophesying: "And Joshua son of Nun, Moses' attendant from his youth, spoke up and said, 'My lord Moses, restrain them!' But Moses said to him, "Are you wrought up on my account? Would that all the Eternal's people were prophets, that the Eternal put the divine spirit upon them!" (Num. 11:28-29)

And it contains the list of way stations through the forty-year wilderness journey through Sinai (Num. 33: 1-49), a passage that has the feel of an incantation when chanted in Hebrew or read in English. Rashi and other commentators teach that the long list of starting and stopping points in Numbers 33 is there to remind us of God's kindness and providence at each stage of our life journeys – a teaching that is very much near the heart of my own Jewish spirituality.

But perhaps the profundity of the Book of Numbers can be most readily found in its very title. Not the English title, but the Hebrew title – "Bemidbar" [במדבר] which means "In the wilderness" (or, more accurately, "In the wilderness of...", the start of the noun phrase "Bemidbar Sinai"/ "In the wilderness of Sinai."

The word "midbar"/ מדבר ("wilderness") is derived from the Hebrew root letters dalet-bet-resh/ דבר, a Hebrew root whose primary meaning is "speak." (For example, "Ani medaber ivrit" [for a male] or "Ani medaberet ivrit" [for a female] is the way you say "I speak Hebrew" in Hebrew, and the word "dibbur" [דיבור] means "speech" or "utterance.")

We are privileged and blessed to live in a part of the country -- in a part of the world -- that contains many beautiful areas of wilderness. I must admit that in thirteen years here I have not yet canoed in the Boundary Waters – though that is very much on my "to do" list – maybe this summer...

And, to be honest, I'm not a hardcore wilderness camping sort of guy. But the beauty of Lake Superior, and Skyline Drive, and Amity Creek and the Munger Trail, and all the areas of natural beauty in the midst of which we live --- they still "speak" to me, and they inspire my own ability to "speak." I imagine that that is true for many of you as well.

I visited the Sinai Peninsula back in December 1981, during my first trip to Israel when I was a college junior. I can well imagine how being in that midbar - that wilderness - could become connected in our ancestors' understanding with the ultimate dibbur – the ultimate "speaking" -- that our tradition calls "Torah."

Now that summer is (finally!) approaching, I hope that each of us will have many opportunities to enjoy the wild beauty of our region – and of the world – and that these encounters with nature will enrich our connections with Torah as well.

In years past, some have assisted in younger students' classrooms or run stations at the Children's Hanukkah Party. Community service volunteer hours are available.









Believe it or not -- especially those of you who got called into my office on a regular basis -- I miss each of you. I relish your return, even if it's just to attend a family member's milestone or a holiday service.




#### JEWISH LIVES SERIES DINNER PROGRAMS AT TEMPLE ISRAEL


The course will take place on three consecutive Thursday evenings, 8 PM ET, from June 8 to June 22.

Get started with the aleph-bet!

Classes starting in June: Register HERE

Familiarity with Hebrew can be a key to feeling at home in the Jewish community. Learn the shapes and sounds of the Hebrew alphabet, with a warm and supportive educator to guide you and a group of classmates for practicing together. Recognize and understand common Hebrew words and phrases that are often heard in Reform congregations and in Jewish prayer. Perfect for Introduction to Judaism alumni and other adults, this course assumes no prior Hebrew experience.

This course has been developed specifically for online learning, and is taught by experienced educators. Live sessions meet weekly over video conferencing. Participants are given access to online course materials and a link to purchase workbook.

#### TEMPLE ISRAEL COVID-19 PROTOCOLS (revised March 10, 2022)

- Anyone AGE 5 OR OVER must be fully vaccinated.
- Anyone AGE 12 OR OVER must have a booster when eligible to be considered fully vaccinated.
- Mask wearing is OPTIONAL.
- Six feet of social distancing is recommended, except for households and "pods" of fully vaccinated persons.
- Services are simulcast on Zoom, there will be no screen sharing of the prayer book. However, members may borrow or purchase prayer books and links for free downloads on your own personal devices can be found in our weekly "TTW" ("Temple This Week") email updates or by contacting the Temple office.
- Please be sure to check the health screening questionnaire posted at the building entrance. All attendees are required to review the questions and, if the answer to any question is "yes," should leave the building. We rely on attendees to individually review the questions and to be honest in their answers.
- We are maximizing efforts to maintain good air quality and recommend everyone get vaccinated.
